

10 Common Grant Writing Mistakes

#10 No Statistics or Data

- Artists must tell their story, by indicating results
- Numbers of albums sold, exhibitions, productions
- Data which indicates the demand or interest in your art
- Statistics should speak to your artistic practice and your work (avoid broad statements)

#9 Submitting Late Applications

- A very frequent issue (happens to everyone)
- Oftentimes, systems crash at the last minute
- Fill out online applications in advance, and press submit as early as possible
- Always save a copy, before pressing submit
- When in doubt, reach out!

#8 Not Utilizing Attachments

- As an artist, your work needs to be seen, heard, and experienced
- Many applicants often leave this blank
- Use every attachment available!
- Ideas: Testimonials, photos (add captions), newspaper clippings, awards, features, interviews, brief videos

#7 Underselling Your Work

- Show history or track record of past success
- Provide specific examples of past works, descriptions
- Include statistics without judgement
- Don't hold back this is the moment to brag about your accomplishments!

#6 Not Expressing Urgency

- Particularly key during the post-Covid economy
- Indicate any significant challenge create urgency!
- Use persuasive language, such as:
 - > This grant is essential because...
 - > This funding will enable me to immediately....
 - > Without this grant, my artistic practice will...
- Urgency helps funders prioritize!

#5 Starting from Scratch

Tip: keep a folder of the following key documents:

- Annual budget what will it cost to operate this year?
- Strategic pitches all past grant applications
- Common attachments images of your work with descriptions, your bio, team member bios, list of records/ productions/ works produced

#4 No Commitment to Long-Term Projects

- It's often clear when a project has been invented to win the grant
- Instead, stick to your artistic practice, style and area of focus
- Long-term work will often receive more interest and investment from funders – it's a relationship

#3 Spelling and Grammar Mistakes

- Can be frustrating for grant reviewers
- Makes the application harder to read, reduces success
- Consider authoring proposals in Microsoft Word or Google Docs, then copy and paste content
- All proposals should be thoroughly reviewed

#2 Using Too Much Jargon

- Write so that reviewers get it!
- Using complex language or many acronyms can make it difficult to understand
- Focus on using the funder's language and key words
- Tip: Have a friend or family member read your proposal

#1 Not Answering the Question!

- Very frustrating for funders
- Re-read your responses, even aloud
- Ask yourself: did I answer the question?
- Avoid vague statements or unnecessary statistics
- Try to include the answer to the question in the first sentence



Arts Grant Opportunities

Arts Grants - Structure

- 1. Begin with an online portal. E.g. OAC "NOVA"
- 2. Provide an artist bio, CV, and history
- 3. Answer specific questions relevant to your project, the impact on yourself as an artist, and the broad impact
- 4. A budget with detailed expenses
- 5. Signing all declaration pages and submission

Ontario Creates: Industry Development Program closes March 4, 2021 by 5:00pm

- 75% of budget, between \$5,000-\$60,000
- Growth and sustainability in the book, magazine, film, television, and interactive digital media sectors
- Ontario Creates: Film Fund Production closes March 10, 2021 by 5:00 PM
 - Up to \$400,000
 - Provides support to Ontario producers for feature film projects with development and production financing

- Toronto Arts Council: Long-Term Dance Projects closes March 15, 2021
 - Up to \$45,000 (\$15,000/yr. for 3 years)
 - Provides mid-career and established professional dance artists with opportunity to take an extended period of time to develop and present a dance work or program of works

Funding Opportunities: April

- Ontario Arts Council Dance Projects closes April 8, 2021
- The development, production and presentation of dance;
 - Development of new dance work(s): maximum \$5,000
 - Production and presentation of dance: maximum \$20,000
 - Dance series/festivals: maximum \$15,000
 - > Dance sector development initiatives: maximum \$5,000

Funding Opportunities: April

- Ontario Arts Council: Music Creation Projects closes April 14, 2021
 - > Self-directed Creation: up to \$4,000
 - Commissioning: up to \$20,000
 - Supports Ontario-based professional music creators at all career stages, working in all music genres/styles, to create original musical works

Ontario Arts Council: Visual Artists Creation Projects closes May 4, 2021

- Emerging artists: \$5,000
- Mid-Career artists: \$7,500
- Established artists: \$15,000
- Supports professional Ontario-based visual artists to create new work.
- Reflects the range of artistic practices in the visual arts, and to support excellence, regional activity, diverse artists and communities.

- Canada Council for the Arts: cut-off date May 19, 2021
- **Professional Development for Arts Professionals**
 - > Up to \$10,000
 - Supports the career growth of Canadian arts professionals
 - By encouraging knowledge-sharing and participation in a wide range of development opportunities.

- Radio Starmaker Fund: closes May 20, 2021
- Funding Program for Black, Indigenous, & People of Colour

Up to \$25,000 for any music related expenses; recording, promotion, publicity, advertising, digital marketing, touring, videos, etc.

- You must show full-length or bundle sales of at least 1,500 units to qualify.
- if you have been nominated for a Grammy, Juno or the Polaris prize shortlist over past 5 years, you qualify

FACTOR Juried Sound Recording, deadline TBA

- 75% of the total eligible budget, to a maximum of \$67,500 (including Radio Marketing) for General Artist
- > Up to \$10,000 can be spent in the sound recording component
- Contributes toward the cost of acquiring, producing and marketing a full-length album.
- funds a portion of the cost of production of an original fulllength sound recording; contributes to marketing/ promotion

Funding Opportunities: Open

FACTOR Songwriter Development, rolling deadline

- > 75% of the total eligible costs up to \$2,000
- toward a year of songwriting initiatives, such as domestic and international travel for co-writing sessions and trips, songwriting camps and workshops, and eligible showcases.
 - Registration details from your performing rights organization;
 - 3 commercially exploited copyrights in the past 12 months; and
 - 10 songs written or co-written in the past 12 months.

Funding Opportunities: June

- Toronto Arts Council: Playwrights Program closes June 15, 2021
 - \$2,000 for new or emerging playwrights with little or no prior history of production.
 - \$8,000 for mid-career or senior playwrights with a history of professional production.
 - > Provides support to playwrights for the writing of stage plays

Funding Opportunities: June

- Toronto Arts Council: Writers Program closes June 15, 2021
 - > \$5,000 for writers in the early stages of their career
 - \$10,000 for writers with an established writing career
 - Supports the creation of new literary works or works-in-progress
 - In the genres of fiction, literary non-fiction, poetry and oral traditions such as storytelling, dub, rap and spoken-word.

Funding Opportunities: June

Ontario Arts Council: Visual Arts Projects closes June 17, 2021

- Presentation: up to \$10,000
- Curatorial Research and Development: up to \$10,000
- Organizations, ad hoc groups/collectives and independent curators to present visual arts projects that exhibit, document or disseminate the work of professional Ontario visual artists, reach Ontario audiences;
- Programs that provide professional development for artists
